



From the **S**ecretary's **D**esk

Brethren, we are well into the 2020 Masonic Year and we still have twentysix (26) members who have not paid their 2020 dues. Within that number are 5 members who owe both 2019 and 2020 dues. The 2020 dues were due on January 1, 2020. I will soon start processing the five (5) members who owe two years dues for suspension for non-payment of dues.

Federal Regulations do not allow you to pay dues with a company or business check. They must be paid with personal funds.



Over the last few decades, Himo economists and psychologists have quietly documented the

many ways in which a person's IQ matters. But, research suggests that a nation's IQ matters so much more. As Garett Jones argues in Hive Mind, modest differences in national IQ can explain most cross-country inequalities. Whereas IQ scores do a moderately good job of predicting individual wages, information processing power, and brain size, a country's average score is a much stronger bellwether of its overall prosperity.

Drawing on an expansive array of research from psychology, economics, management, and political science, Jones argues that intelligence and cognitive skill are significantly more important on a national level than on an individual one because they have "positive spillovers." On average, people who do better on standardized tests are more patient, more cooperative, and have better memories. As a result, these qualities—and others necessary to take on the complexity of a modern economy—become more prevalent in a society as national test scores rise. What's more, when we are surrounded by slightly more patient, informed, and cooperative neighbors we take on these qualities a bit more ourselves. In other words, the worker bees in every nation create a "hive mind" with a power all its own. Once the hive is established, each individual has only a tiny impact on his own life.

Jones makes the case that, through better nutrition and schooling, we can raise IQ, thereby fostering higher savings rates, more productive teams, and more effective bureaucracies. After demonstrating how test scores that matter little for individuals can mean a world of difference for nations, the book leaves readers with policy-oriented conclusions and hopeful speculation: Whether we lift up the bottom through changing the nature of work, institutional improvements, or freer immigration, it is possible that this period of massive global inequality will be a short season by the standards of human history if we raise our global IQ.

Master's Message

Brethren -

Social distancing continues. I admit, I am bit stir crazy. Officers in a Lodge as busy as AW are used to being together two or three times a week. We are finding other ways to "meet," but I do miss seeing everyone in the flesh. If you or your family have been adversely affected by measures to stem COVID-19, please let me know. The Lodge cannot provide assistance if we are not aware you are in need.

Recently, the Lodge received an information query from Alexandria's Equal Justice Initiative. The Equal Justice Initiative is committed to "ending mass incarceration and excessive punishment in the United States, to challenging racial and economic justice, and to protecting basic human rights for the most vulnerable people in American society." Two of EJI's initiatives focus on fully documenting and remembering victims of past injustices. The Legacy Museum: From Enslavement to Mass Incarceration chronicles the African American experience in the United States. The National Memorial for Peace and Justice recognizes the lives of the more than 4400 African American men, women, and children hanged, burned alive, shot, drowned, and beaten to death by white mobs between 1877 and 1950. The museum and memorial are colocated in Montgomery, Alabama.

The memorial is "constructed of over 800 Corten steel monuments, one for each country in the United States where a racial terror lynching took place. EJI hopes the memorial inspires communities across the nation to enter an era of truth-telling about racial injustice and their own local histories." Through its Community Remembrance Project, EJI assists communities in erecting historical markers, organize public ceremonies, and develop local education programs. Alexandria's EJI Committee is in the process of researching the documented lynching of two

men: Joseph McCoy on April 23, 1897, and Benjamin Thomas on August 8, 1899.


The 1897 lynching led the committee to the Lodge. McCoy was taken from his jail cell by a mob of as many as 700 in the very early hours of April 23, but disturbances began the evening before. The first mob that came to the jail, then located in the first floor of the Alexandria City Hall building, arrived at 10:00p.m. and was disbanded. April 22 was a Thursday and the Lodge held a stated communication that evening. The Lodge was also located in the City Hall at that time. Alexandria EJI inquired if records were maintained of the meeting, including attendance lists

I was pleased to receive the inquiry. Our Lodge has been a part of the City of Alexandria for more than 237 years. We were once the keepers of the City's museum. Just as we invest time and talent in the preservation of our collection and continued research of George Washington and Freemasonry, we can only hope that the world around us continues to seek light and learn from its past. Unfortunately, I was able to do little more for Alexandria EJI than confirm that a stated communication was held the evening of April 22 and that we have records for it. It has been a longstanding protocol of our Lodge to safeguard the contents of our minutes books. We are fortunate to have had forefathers that protected the minutes books so that we can explore our rich history; however, the proceedings of tiled Masonic communications are not for public consumption. When excerpts have been printed, the research was completed by Masons and the publications approved by the Lodge.

The proceedings of April 22 were completely Masonic and relayed no information on activities outside of Lodge-related items. The inquiry, however, highlights the rich history AW22 has in our community. A review of the *Alexandria Gazette* articles covering activities on April 23 illustrate, in graphic detail, the lynching of McCoy. The language is shocking. The articles also include the names of the citizens who investigated the crime, including numerous Past Masters of AW22.

It is essential that we all seek to understand our history and the history of our community. I hope that this message encourages you to do some research of your own into the work of the Equal Justice Initiative and the unfortunate part of our collective past that includes lynching and systemic racism. I hope it also challenges each of us to remember that drawing conclusions about a man's character based on uninformed perception and superficial attributes is one of the greatest affronts to the Constitutions of Freemasonry. We must strive to always improve; after all, we cannot make good men better if we are not also bettering ourselves. Please visit the following links for more information:

As a middle class white man who grew up in a 99 percent white rural community in Kentucky, I have always had difficulty understanding race relations. It wasn't until I moved to Washington, DC, that I truly experienced a diverse community and witnessed blatant racism. In my own efforts to seek greater light on this topic, I found Isabel Wilkerson's Pulitzer Prize winning The Warmth of Other Suns: The Epic Story of America's Great Migration exceedingly educational. Following the story of three African American families escaping the Jim Crow South over three decades, this nonfiction book was engaging, enlightening, and transformative.
