

WEDE HARER GUZO 1978 HAILU MERGIA AND THE DAHLAK BAND



The largest population of Ethiopians outside of Africa can be found right here in the Washington D.C. region. Being exposed to the Ethiopian diaspora has made me fall in love with Ethiopian food, people, and music. The groove of this album was unlike anything I had ever heard when I first listened to the album

The year was 1974. 85% of Ethiopians were living hand-to-mouth. 93% of the land was owned by the church, the emperor, and his vassals. 75% of the produce of the people's labor went to these entities.

Student protests had erupted against Emperor Haile Selassie in the midsixties, but had been suppressed. Now, in the sprawling capital city of Addis Ababa— ballooned by unbridled population growth, beleaguered by famine and economic downturn, and chafing against the antique chains of feudalism— the people were ready for revolt.

Like all revolutions, it was borne of idealism.

Like all revolutions, it would fall short of achieving the extent of its utopian vision.

The military coup that would precipitate this revolt was preceded, though, by a revolution of a different kind.

It has been a long-established principle that one of the first targets for elimination under a totalitarian regime is the freedom of expression, and the Ethiopian autocracy provided no exception. The emperor had, in 1948, issued an edict: that all recordings and pressings were to be approved through state-sanctioned channels, in order to censor rhetoric and ideolo-

gies which might be subversive to the medieval (in every sense of the word) status quo.

Through these restrictions, however, Haile Selassie only succeeded in galvanizing the people against him. Soon, a lustrous black market sprang up, and foreign (largely American) records began to be smuggled into the country and traded person-to-person—a sort of island-hopping campaign of white hot rebellion in the form of music. If Marx said that religion is the opiate of the masses, this music was the Dexedrine. Soon, a veritable pharmacopeia of funk, jazz, rhythm and blues, rock 'n' roll, and other undesirable influences had pervaded Ethiopia. The people of Addis Ababa were the biggest junkies of all, and by the early '60s, the Ethiopian Golden Age of Music had seized the citizenry of the capital in a way that no tyrannical government ever could. Inspired by the records they secreted, and, standing on the shoulders of those taboo giants who dealt in the musical narcotics they craved, the players of Ethiopia became purveyors of their own brand of dope—a sound which fused American genres with traditional Ethiopian styles, and which sophisticated the machinery of both forms into a battle rifle of the people.

It is at this crossroads of creative spirit and governmental oppression that the Walias Band, with keyboardist and composer Hailu Mergia, rose to prominence. In the smoke and din of the clubs of Addis Ababa, this group worked Ethiopian standards on an anvil of improvisation and foreign influence, hammering traditional compositions into unrecognizable anthems of defiance. Hailu's oxymoronic fusions of familiarity and novelty became emblematic of the new way of life that the general population envisioned for themselves and their countrymen, in which fresh opportunity did not come at the sacrifice of their national identity. To paraphrase Bob Dylan: there was music in the cafés at night, and that music became one with the revolution in the air.

It was to Hailu Mergia's music and to the demand of "land to the tiller" that the emperor was ousted and later assassinated, and a Marxist-Leninist junta called the Derg (ceremonially renamed the "Provisional Military Administrative Council" upon seizing power) replaced the feudal government which had dominated the people and was established as the ruling party. For the first time in living memory, Ethiopians held, with trembling fingers, a fragile hope for the future.

This hope was stillborn. Within three short years of coming to power, the P.M.A.C. had begun systematically executing dissidents and challengers to their supremacy. This period, known as the Red Terror, also saw a public curfew enacted in Addis Ababa from 12:00 - 6:00 A.M., and further regulation of the music industry. Ironically, the music which had helped

bring about the revolution was now hobbled by the regime it had installed, and the Ethiopian Golden Age of Music suffered an ignominious demise. In response, Hailu began creating instrumental tracks so as to not incite the wrath of the lunatic powers that be. As Hailu recalls: "When you sing or write lyrics, you have to support the government, and if you don't do that then you have a problem." Playing with the Dahlak Band at the Ghion Hotel, Hailu became a central figure of six-hour, jam session-style concerts, which were scheduled to coincide with the new curfews and intended as a soothing balm for the betrayed visionaries of Addis Ababa.

The album Wede Harer Guzo by Hailu Mergia comes from this post-promise period. Released in 1978, it was recorded live in concert at the Ghion. Central to the album's sound are strident keyboard solos, screaming horns, hypnotic chanting, and rocksteady basslines over which a nomadic guitar sometimes wanders. Despite the circumstances surrounding its recording, this album is not an expression of despair—rather, it is one of indomitable joy, albeit mixed with a blue tinge of rumination. Wede is ten tracks of pure Ethiopian resilience, which, though hard-earned, is as irrepressible as Hailu's organ on the album's title track ("Wede Harer Guzo").

That track in particular showcases best the overall mood and tone of the album. At once a requiem for the past and an exultation of the future, the rhythm section on this song is mournful and dirge-like, upon which is overlaid Hailu's felicitous, songbird instrumentation on the keys. The effect is like a rainbow in a thunderstorm. It's a tribute to the graveyard of dreams that the Ethiopian people had left behind in the wake of the revolution, but also a declaration of perseverance for the day when those dreams are resurrected. Here, in this graveyard, death is temporary, and Hailu's improvised solo cries, "come forth." The song leaves the listener on a note which drives heavenward and creates in its wake a blissful acceptance of whatever adversities in our lives that may be left unresolved.

Hailu Mergia defected from Ethiopia in 1981 while on tour in the United States. He moved to Washington, D.C., first opening a restaurant, then becoming a taxi driver based around Dulles International Airport for nearly three decades. All the while, Hailu kept his keyboard in his trunk and practiced between fares. After Wede Harer Guzo was rediscovered in 2016 and popularized in the U.S., he reentered the music industry and has subsequently released two new albums—free at last from censorship or persecution. The Ethiopian music industry, too, has seen a revitalization since the collapse of the P.M.A.C. It is proof positive of the legitimacy of Hailu's album and of the Ethiopian ethos which it celebrates: that the hope which springs eternal in the human breast— even if long-delayed in its realization— proves itself inexorable in the end.
