

October 13th-15th will be a very busy run for us. Please refer to page 3 for a schedule at a glance and please familiarize yourself with the details below:


#### 18.00 OCTOBER 14TH, FRIENDS & FAMILY NIGHT DINNER



### ALBUM OF THE MONTH

COME ON IN R.L. BURNSIDE, 1998



Mississippi is the soul of the Country, and its music is the foundation of modern music. With its modern twist, Come on In, connects the soul of our music to modern listeners.

It is futile to attempt to trace the origins of blues music back to a definitive point of inception. This is in part due to historical neglect — there were no scribes inhabiting the field houses and "juke joints" of Black, Southern laborers around the turn of the 20<sup>th</sup> Century, and if the powers-that-were-at-the-time considered the music and culture of these communities at all, their thoughts would have doubtlessly turned to schemes designed to suppress and contain, rather than to chronicle and preserve. The blues' true origins are further obscured by the genre's disparate compositional DNA—a heterogeneous mixture of African tribal rhythms, Southern spirituals, Moorish instrumentation, and the inextricable agony of the African-American slaves and their sharecropping descendants who formed the genre as an expression of the injustice of their tortured, often-transitory lives.

Structurally, most blues songs are not complex. More often than not, they are looping eight- or twelve-bar I-IV-V progressions, often accompanied by repetitive AAAB-schemed lyrics which would evolve to include not only the aforementioned sorrows of its progenitors, but also throaty assertions of virility and excess, historical accounts in the vain of oral tradition, and ballads of mythical heroes and villains alike. Over time, the blues became its own language, with constant allusions and homages interwoven into its genetic-makeup. And so, while the blues may be limited in the breadth of its structure, its depth is boundless to aficionados who can speak this language; whose native tongue is rest-

lessness and whose weariness is abated only by the sensory extravagance that came to be celebrated in the genre; who've got their mojo working and a mojo hand; who've got a big boss man and were born under a bad sign; who shot down little Delia and spent last night in the pines—those who boogie chillen, as it were. It is a language that mellows and matures alongside both the listener and the performer, in light of the experiences we pick up along the road like so many rocks inside a traveler's shoe.

This depth fostered the development of a litany of offshoots from the blues style: Chicago Blues, Memphis Blues, Delta Blues, New Orleans Blues, British Blues, et al., each possessing unique elements distinguishing them from the last.

Historically, Hills Country Blues is among the oldest subgenres in blues music. Echoing out of the hills and hollers of Northeast Mississippi in a primal oomph—a "deep down hypnotic boogie," as it may be heard called there—is this percussion- and rhythm-obsessed hypnotic spell, unlike most other blues subgenres in that rather than making itself distinct via additional qualifiers to the blues formula, Hills Country Blues distills that formula down to its most basic elements. A driving beat propels a one-chord slaughterhouse of sound designed to keep the whiskey flowing and the party going for the laborers who chopped what little cotton was to be found in the Hills region of Mississippi, bound on one side by the River but otherwise poorly suited for agriculture. The nearby Delta region would be its own hotbed of creativity in early blues lore, and is often cited as the original style of blues music, but there is a case to be made (based most prominently on its reductivist style) that Hills Blues may in fact have predated the Delta variety. Regardless, scholars agree in unison that it was northern Mississippi where the genre as a whole congealed into what is agreed to be blues music.

"They [can] call them Chicago Blues, but ninety percent of the people playin' blues got their home in Mississippi," said Hills Blues guitarist and vocalist R.L. Burnside, reflecting on his time in Chicago during his early twenties. Burnside is the perfect symbol of Hills Blues, and of the genre as a whole. Throughout his entire 60-year career, Burnside never deviated from the core stylings of Hills Blues — he stayed with one-chord song structures, driving rhythm and percussion, and traditional blues subjects. However, with each progressive artistic effort, that sim-

plistic structure is subverted, inverted, elasticized, pulverized, deified, crucified, and otherwise contorted into epistemological meditations on what the meaning of the genre truly is.

These experimentations are reflective of the depth of experience incurred by Burnside as he progressed through his life and career, which was not always as a musician. Through the majority of his life, Burnside supported his wife and thirteen children as an agricultural laborer, a bounty hunter, and a bootlegger (a career that ended with him serving six-months in the penitentiary for murder). Each of these experiences shaped the color and texture of his music, which bore the same smile lines and battlescars as its creator on their mutual journey through life. Like branches grafted onto a live oak, these experiences worked their way into Burnside's voice, guitar playing, and songwriting. As he progressed through his life, Burnside began layering conventions of funk, disco, electronic, and hip hop in his songs, while inveterately maintaining the structure of Hills Country Blues. One of his essential works comes from near the end of his life – Come On In, released just six years before his death. In this album, you can hear Burnside's nostalgic allegiance to the blues of his Mississippi childhood fused with an openminded exploration of what that genre truly is. Burnside's comfortability in "playing with his food" is something that can only be achieved in Burnside's then-seventy-two years of familiarity with his craft, and is a one-of-a-kind experience to behold as a listener.
