



The Saint of Lost Causes by Justin Townes Earle constitutes a virtuosic work of art that captures the essence of Americana, folk, and country music, while offering an introspective journey into the nature of pain. 

Justin Townes Earle was born to a drug addict, named after one, and died as one as well. His father is country rocker Steve Earle, responsible for the timeless purity of "Guitartown," which is one of the best songs in modern times. He is named after honky-tonk ghost Townes Van Zandt, who lived his life out of backrooms and with one foot in the graves at all times. Both the elder Earle and Van Zandt were polysubstance abusers specializing in heroin, and so it seemed almost predestined when Justin began using hard drugs at the age of twelve. By his death, he had been to rehab nine times: "I believed the myth for a long time, [that] I had to destroy myself to make great art." Eventually, Earle couldn't outpace his demons — he died from a fentanyl overdose in Nashville in 2020.

The self-destructive nature of human beings is a complex and deeply ingrained aspect of our existence. It manifests in various forms, from unhealthy habits and addictions to destructive relationships and environmental degradation. We often succumb to short-term pleasures at the expense of long-term well-being, indulging in overconsumption, substance abuse, and reckless behavior. Our propensity for self-sabotage can also be seen in the way we harm our emotional and mental health through self-doubt, self-criticism, and negative thought patterns. Understanding and addressing these self-destructive tendencies is a fundamental challenge for our species, as it requires an inorganic

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THE LODGE OF WASHINGTON BY F.L. BROCKETT

One of the required readings for any AW22 Mason is F.L. Brockett's *The Lodge of Washington*. It details the Lodge's history from our inception to 1876. With Washington's Masonic birthday coming up, here is a snippet from the book that outlines the process the Lodge went through to honor our most beloved Brother. : David

After the death of Washington, it was the desire of the Lodge that its name should be changed, so as to embrace that of "WASHINGTON," and with this view, on the 11th day of October, 1804, the following resolution was adopted:

"That the Worshipful Master of this Lodge apply to the Grand Master of the Grand Lodge of Virginia, for permission to alter the designation of this Lodge from that of the ALEXANDRIA LODGE, No. 22, to that of the ALEXANDRIA WASHINGTON LODGE, No. 22. And at the ensuing Communication of the Grand Lodge this request was acceded to, and a *new charter* ordered to be issued. The Lodge, however, did not desire to surrender its charter, but simply to alter its designation, and at the next Grand Annual Communication of the Grand Lodge, held at Richmond, on the 9th day of December, 1805, the following preamble and resolution was adopted:

"WHEREAS, at the last Grand Annual Communication a request was made by the ALEXANDRIA LODGE, No. 22, for permission to change the name of the said Lodge to that of the ALEXANDRIA WASHINGTON LODGE, No. 22, which request was acceded to, and a new charter ordered to be issued; and whereas, this order did not meet the wishes of the brethren of the said Lodge, who having had our illustrious brother General GEORGE WASHINGTON for their first Master, whose name is inscribed as such in their original charter, they then were and still are desirous of preserving their said charter, as an honorable testimony of his regard for them, and only wish to be permitted by the Grand Lodge to assume the name of the ALEXANDRIA WASHINGTON LODGE, No. 22, without

changing their said charter; therefore,

"Resolved, That the said Lodge be permitted to assume the said name, and that it be henceforth denominated the ALEXANDRIA WASHINGTON LODGE, No. 22, and that an authenticated copy of this resolution be attached to their said charter.

"Duly copied by me from the records of the Grand Lodge of Virginia, as witness my hand, and the seal of the said Grand Lodge, this 17th day of December, A.L. 5805, A.D. 1805."
